High court won't hear appeal in '83 slaying

The man slashed a woman's throat in a wooded area of Jackson County.

The U.S. Supreme Court has re-fused to hear the appeal of a man sentenced to death in 1990 for fatal-ly stabbing and cutting the throat of a Jackson County woman.

A Jackson County jury convicted Jessie D. Williams of capital mur-der and sentenced to him death in the Jan. 12, 1983, killing of Karen Pierce, whose body was found in a wooded area by hunters a few days after her death.

The state Supreme Court in 1987 upheld Williams' conviction but ordered a new sentencing hearing. In 1996, the high court upheld the second death sentence. Williams appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Williams' conviction was based mainly on testimony by his co-de-fendant, Thomas Terrell Evans, who entered a guilty plea to accesso-ry after the fact. Evans received a

ry after the fact. Evans received a five-year sentence.
Evans testified that Pierce left the Scoreboard Lounge with him the night of Jan. 12 to go the Old Plantation Home. Evans said he had planned to have sex with Pierce and for her to have sex with a third man, Mike Norwood. Pierce had sex with Williams and Norwood. with Williams and Norwood, Evans testified.

The group later made stops for beer and other activities before prooceding to the wooded area, Evans testified. Pierce tried to run away, but Williams tackled her and took into the woods, Evans said. He said he later found Williams standing over Pierce's body with a knife in his
